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Eastern African scientists create new opportunities for growth

The second biobusiness acceleration bootcamp

S upporting biological based innovation projects in six eastern Africa countries remains the core activity of BioInnovate Africa. The Programme funds 20 projects that are collaboratively implemented by scientists, businesspeople and government officers to transform biological-based ideas and inventions into commercially viable enterprises.

On 22-26 July 2019, the Programme held its second biobusiness acceleration bootcamp in Nairobi, which targeted its implementing partners for projects running for period 2019-2021. The week-long event streamlined expectations from scientists and business executives in project implementation and strengthened capacities of participating firms to commercialise new technology. The bootcamp also enabled participants to harmonise their roles and responsibilities as co-developers with a shared goal of introducing new products into the market.

Financial training to do the right things right

In September 2019, BioInnovate Africa organized a financial management training workshop to strengthen capacities of finance and accounts officers managing the Programme's project grants. The workshop was carried out in Kenya, and in Uganda. The two workshops were attended by finance and accounts officers from the six eastern Africa countries (Burundi, Ethiopia, Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania and Uganda) where the Programme is implemented. Participants had a training experience that inspired them and sharpened their financial management skills for effective project delivery.

Mr Harold Adiga, from Uganda, attended the training and said it enabled him to understand, appreciate and adhere to the recommended financial management practices and reporting of the Programme. "I now have a better understanding of good and bad grant management practices which I will apply to better manage BioInnovate Africa project grant and others that I support in my organization," he said.

Ms Veronica Gichana, from Kenya, also attended the training and said it was timely and helpful to her day-to-day grants' management work. "The facilitators were engaging and took the time to thoroughly answer the questions raised by the participants," she said.

Regional bioeconomy strategy

BioInnovate Africa is supporting the development of a regional innovation-driven bioeconomy strategy for eastern Africa. On 30 September – 1 October 2019, the Programme organized a workshop in Nairobi on building scenarios for the strategy, in collaboration with African Technology Policy Studies (ATPS) and the East African Science and Technology Commission (EASTECO). The participants comprised stakeholders from eastern African countries representing academia, civil society and community based organizations, industrial and commercial firms, government and policy makers. The key outcome was identification of bioeconomy priority areas informed by national and regional needs to guide the development of the strategy. The first draft of the strategy is currently under review.

Sixth Programme Advisory Committee meeting

The 6th BioInnovate Africa Programme Advisory Committee (PAC) meeting was held in Bujumbura, Burundi, on 7-8 November 2019. The meeting was preceded by a high-level policy seminar on the role of the public sector in building innovation ecosystems for a sustainable economy, that was jointly organized by the University of Burundi and the Burundian Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research. A key recommendation from the seminar was the need for enhanced collaboration between universities, industry and government and for greater regional engagement.

After the seminar, the PAC participated in a ground-breaking event for the construction of a factory that will supply eastern Africa region with value-added malaria repellent products made from plant extracts. The event was organized by implementing partner organizations for the Programme's project on <u>Plant Extracts to prevent Malaria in eastern</u> Africa. The PAC interacted with the project implementing team and witnessed the progress they are making in developing value-added malaria repellent products. The PAC also paid a courtesy visit to the Minister for Higher Education and Scientific Research in Burundi, Hon. Prof Gaspard Banyankimbona, and discussed ways to strengthen scientific cooperation with Burundi.

Innovation in the Development Context of eastern Africa

On 27– 29 November 2019, BioInnovate Africa convened a workshop on Innovation in the Development Context of Eastern Africa, in Zanzibar, Tanzania, to identify and address bottle-necks to innovation in the region.

The forum brought together project leaders of 20 initiatives currently being funded by the Programme, and a variety of experts, to map out strategies for strengthening innovation ecosystems for moving biological based ideas and inventions to market.

Key outcomes of the workshop include: collaborative partnerships strengthened among project team members; consensus on matrices for measuring the development outcomes of innovations supported through BioInnovate Africa; and agreements models for managing intellectual property and revenue sharing for innovative products being developed through the programme.

BioInnovate Africa project receives award in support of value addition for honey

On 12 December 2019, Dr Sarah Mubiru was awarded UGX 5,000,000 (USD 1,350), during the grand finale of a television show aired in Uganda dubbed, 'National Social Security Fund (NSSF) Friends with Benefits (FWB) Season 3', also referred to as NSSFFWB3.

Dr Mubiru is a BioInnovate Africa implementing partner for a project that is addressing value addition of honey by <u>producing high-quality Aroma Honey toffees</u> as a healthier option for the population in eastern Africa. She is the Founder and Managing Director of Aroma Honey Limited, located in Kampala, Uganda, which is a start-up business that produces the Aroma Honey toffees.

Dr Mubiru said she is pleased about the award and will use it to facilitate an ongoing construction of the Aroma Honey Toffee factory. "I won the 'Judges Choice' award mainly based on the investment I made to partly use my retirement funds to start the Aroma Honey Limited. The business was perceived by the judges of the show, as one with great impact and potential for significant growth," said Dr Mubiru.

The NSSFFWB3 show is a financial literacy campaign targeting citizens of Uganda. The show showcases people who have received their retirement funds from NSSF and have made prudent financial and investment ventures that are transforming their lives and the community around them.
